Kingston Borough Cyber Crime Monthly Summary – March 2019

In March there were **86** reports made to Action fraud by residents of Kingston borough. The losses described over these 86 reports total £813,959. Meaning an average loss of £9,464 per report.

Unfortunately a company was defrauded by £450,000 due to payment fraud.

The top 3 by **volume** (number of reports) type of fraud is as follows;

Shares Fraud

Unfortunately there were some large amounts lost to fraudulent shares and investment frauds. Share sales & Investment Fraud, are similar in that criminals may impersonate legitimate businesses and cold call victims, to persuade them to invest or purchase shares.

Remember a legitimate investment/shares company will not cold call you. (They don't need to.)

Banking Fraud

Victims have been called or texted from fraudsters claiming to be their bank. The Fraudsters claim that the victim's bank account has been compromised. The fraudster then claims they have opened a new safe account and requests that the victim moves money from their account to the new "safe" account.

This "safe" account is controlled by the fraudster and the victim loses their money.

So please remember (and inform others) to;

- Never disclose passwords or other personal information in response to an email, phone call or letter purporting to be from your bank or other financial institution.
- If you are unsure if an email is genuine, contact your bank via other means. (calling the number on the back of your card)
- Banks will NEVER ask you to move money from your account in to another.
- Banks no longer send links in text messages, don't click on any links in text messages you receive purporting to be from your bank.
- Remember many scammers have the ability to spoof authentic numbers to fool you into thinking that they are genuine. (Your mobile phone will display the spoofed number when the fraudster calls you.)

Calls to the 101 police non-emergency number will be free from April 2020

The Home Office has announced that it will scrap the 15p charge and spend £5m a year to fund the phone service in the UK.

Home Secretary Sajid Javid said the move would benefit "millions of people every year".

Victims' Commissioner in England and Wales Baroness Newlove - who previously criticised the charge - called it a "step in the right direction".

The phone service, which receives around 30m calls annually, connects the public to their local police force or one of their choice.

The 101 number was introduced in December 2011 to free-up calls to 999. It is for reporting non-emergency incidents such as criminal damage, anti-social behaviour or stolen vehicles.

Focus on Berrylands Safer Neighbourhood Team Results



On Saturday 8th June following up on recent reports from local residents regarding suspicious behaviour in and around Fishponds, Berrylands DWO's (dedicated ward officers) PC Squire, PC Camp and Sgt Alleway were patrolling through the park when they noticed a strong smell of cannabis. A male sitting on a nearby bench was stopped & searched, leading to the discovery of a large snap bag of cannabis. The male was arrested for possession with intent to supply a Class B Substance. A Section 18 search warrant was granted for the male's home address and more cannabis found with along items/paraphernalia consistent with drug supply. The investigation is ongoing.

This was the teams main "win" for the weekend, however on Friday 7th June Berrylands' DWOs made a number of


stop & searches and gave a community resolution for "personal use" possession of cannabis, as well as the removal of a large knife from the Alpha Estate which was found by a recycling bin in a garden on Hobill Walk by PCSO Carby (with thanks to an eagle eyed resident). The team are actively out looking to disrupt and arrest drug dealers and tackle the related issues in our area.

Theft From Motor Vehicles

Unfortunately theft from motor vehicles has been on the rise across the Borough. Having your car broken into and losing your things to thieves can be very distressing. Here are a few simple steps you can take to keep your vehicle, and what's in it, safe.



1. Always lock it

Fuelling up or popping back into your house to get something are perfect examples of how easy it is to turn your back for a moment and forget your vehicle is unsecured. So get into the habit of locking your vehicle even if you're only going to be away from it for a moment.

2. Close windows and the sun roof to prevent 'fishing'

Leaving windows and the sunroof open invites fishing for items through the gap by hand or with, say, a bent coat hanger, which could also be used to unlock a door for them to get in. Thieves can be ingenious. Don't give them the opportunity.

3. Secure your number plates with tamper-resistant screws


The easiest way to change the identity of a stolen vehicle or avoid speeding tickets and parking tickets is to fit stolen number plates. Using security screws to attach your vehicle's number plates makes it harder for thieves to get your number.

4. Fit locking, anti-tamper wheel nuts to secure alloy wheels

Stolen wheels are valuable, either as parts or for their scrap value. Using locking wheel nuts reduces the risk of your vehicle's wheels being stolen.

5. Secure anything that's on the outside of your vehicle

Anything left on roof-racks, tailgate racks, holiday top boxes or in tool chests are easily stolen when the vehicle is parked. The use of cable locks, padlocks and self-locking tools chests, which are secured to the vehicle, makes them more secure, but still, don't leave things in them if you can avoid it. 6. Take it with you or hide it

Your mobile phone, coins for the car park, sunglasses, packs of medication or other items that can earn quick cash are irresistible to the opportunist thief. Remember, the cost of replacing a window is often much more than that of what's stolen. And it should go without saying that wallets, handbags, purses and credit cards should never be left in an unattended vehicle.

7. Hide electrical items and leave no clues

Leaving sat nav mounts, suction cup marks on windows or cables on view gives it away that you have left a Sat Nav, smartphone or other device in your car. Even if they can't see the Sat Nav or iPad they might still break in to see if it's stored in the car, out of sight.

8. Take your documents with you

Having a vehicle's registration and insurance documents could let a thief pretend to be the owner. Which means they could sell it on quite easily. So, never leave any documents in the vehicle.



9. Park in well-lit and busier areas

It can take less than 30 seconds to break into a vehicle. Parking in well-lit areas and busy streets increases the chances of a thief being seen, so they'll probably steer clear.

10. Choose your car park wisely

If possible, always try to park in well-lit and staffed car parks or those with a Park Mark safer parking award. To find one, simply check out Park Mark.

Catalytic converter theft

The precious metal in catalytic converters has led to an increase in their theft. To keep yours safe, ask your car dealer if they can give you any advice on locks or guards that are approved by the vehicle manufacturer.

Alternatively, try to make sure your vehicle is parked in a garage overnight, or if you have a commercial vehicle park it in a secure compound. If this isn't possible, park in an area that's

well-lit and overlooked and try to park so that the convertor can't be easily reached by potential thieves. Vehicles that sit high above the road are particularly vulnerable.

You should also register your converter and mark it with a forensic marker, which will make it harder for thieves to dispose of. Visit securedbydesign.com for more details.
